Assembly Bill No. 361 amends Government Code section 54953(e) by adding provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions. The West Valley Water District adopted a resolution determining, by majority vote, that, as a result of the declared State of Emergency, the District is adopting the State protocol which allows meetings in person and/or via teleconference. Accordingly, it has been determined that all Board and Workshop meetings of the West Valley Water District will be held pursuant to Assembly Bill No. 361, the Brown Act and will be conducted via teleconference and in person. SUBJECT: JANUARY LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

BACKGROUND:

The Legislature returned to Sacramento in early December to "organize" ahead of the 2023-24 Legislative Session. Members have been introducing bills for the last several weeks, a small preview of the several thousand bills we will see before the February 15 bill introduction deadline

On January 10th Governor Gavin Newsom presented his budget proposal that serves as a starting point for months of negotiations at the state Capitol as advocates push for money for their causes and leaders of the Assembly and Senate pursue their spending priorities.

More consequential budget decisions will come in May, when Newsom will issue a revised budget. That spending plan will reflect updated economic forecasts and launch more intense negotiations ahead of the June 15 deadline for the Legislature to pass a final state budget for the next fiscal year.

DISCUSSION:

Staff has prepared a legislative update (Exhibit A) with relative information regarding the proposed state budget, drought updates and the upcoming calendar for the 2023 legislative session.

Additionally staff has put together a legislative reference book (Exhibit B) that highlights our local electeds on the federal, state and local level for easy reference as we increase WVWD's outreach efforts. Letters have been mailed to local electeds congratulating them on their elections or reelections to office from the WVWD Board of Directors.

Governor Newsom presents his proposed 2023-24 State Budget.

Governor Newsom presented his proposed 2023-24 State Budget. The proposed \$296.9 billion budget (\$223.6 billion in General Fund) projects a \$22.5 billion shortfall. This shortfall is slightly lower than the estimated \$24 billion shortfall hypothesized by the Legislative Analyst's Office. The Governor's proposed State Budget forecasts General Fund revenues to be \$29.5 billion lower than that of the 2022 Budget Act's projections for the coming fiscal year.

Aware of the coming fiscal shortfall and the prospect of a recession due to continued high inflation, stock market declines, and multiple federal reserve bank interest rate increases, the Governor's proposed budget would leave untouched the state's \$35.6 billion in total budgetary reserves (Budget Stabilization Account: \$22.4 billion; Public School System Stabilization Account: \$8.5 billion; Special Fund for Economic Uncertainties (SFEU): \$3.8 billion; and Safety Net Reserve: \$900 million). Notably, the state's Budget Stabilization Account balance is currently at its constitutional maximum amount, with a total of \$951 million required to be used for infrastructure investments in the current fiscal year.

Although Governor Newsom's proposed budget does not officially project a recession, the administration signaled it has plans in place should economic revenue conditions weaken in the spring. Such plans include withdrawals from the state's reserve accounts in addition to program reductions. Conversely, should economic conditions improve, then the administration may reconsider proposed spending delays and reductions.

To close the projected State Budget shortfall, the Governor's Budget proposal includes:

- \$7.4 billion in funding delays for multiple items across the 2023-22 through 2023-24 fiscal years.
- \$5.7 billion in reductions and pullbacks reducing spending and pulling back certain items that were included in the 2022 Budget Act. Significant items include \$3 billion included in the 2022 Budget as an inflationary adjustment and a \$750 million Unemployment Trust Fund debt payment this fiscal year.
- \$4.3 billion in fund shifts moving certain expenditures in the 2022-23 and 2023-24 fiscal years from the General Fund to other funds including, among other things, shifting certain zero-emission vehicle commitments to the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund.
- \$3.9 billion in trigger reductions placing certain items on a trigger that would potentially restore reductions in the 2024 Governor's Budget. Commitments include constitutional obligations, baseline adjustments, and the cost of funding for all items included in the trigger. The Governor's Budget notes that these items are mainly in housing, parks, workforce training, and climate and transportation.
- \$1.2 billion in limited revenue generation and borrowing, with most of the funds in the category coming from loans from special funds and from the renewal of the Managed Care Organization (MCO) Tax.



Additionally, the proposed budget will utilize several resiliency measures to close shortfalls projected in the coming years, including future inflationary adjustments being withdrawn: a \$1.7 billion general obligation bond liability, \$2.1 billion to reduce lease revenue bond liability, \$4 billion in supplemental deposits to the Budget Stabilization Account, and \$4 billion in additional safety net reserve deposits.

Even in addressing the budgetary shortfall, the Governor's Budget will continue making investments from recent budgets advancing the shared priorities of the Governor and the Legislature that may impact special districts, including climate change, homelessness, retirement liabilities, and general governance.

Climate Change

Over the past two years, the Governor and the Legislature have allocated nearly \$54 billion over the next five years to advance the state's climate agenda. Although the proposed budget reflects the projected decline in General Fund revenues, the budget maintains a reduced amount of roughly \$48 billion in the previously outlined climate investments.

Proposed climate program reductions are spread across several areas. If the state realizes sufficient revenues come January 2024, the Governor proposes reversing most of these reductions. Further, the administration will continue to pursue available federal funding, including the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) and the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), to offset the decrease of state funds for these climate-related programs. As a final backstop, the Governor and his administration have indicated they will engage the Legislature to explore a natural resources general obligation bond for the November 2024 statewide ballot.

Zero-Emission Vehicles (ZEV) Acceleration

The 2021 and 2022 Budget Acts committed \$10 billion over the next five years in investments to adhere to the state's ZEV agenda, including infrastructure and incentives for in-state manufacturing. Governor Newsom's Proposed 2023-24 State Budget maintains \$8.9 billion in those investments but includes \$2.5 billion of General Fund reductions across various ZEV programs, partially offset by \$1.4 billion in funds shifted from the Cap-and-Trade Greenhouse Gas Auction Revenues. In addition to continuing to pursue federal funding opportunities, the proposed budget includes a mechanism to allocate any discretionary Cap-and-Trade auction proceeds towards the reduced ZEV programs.

Other significant budget adjustments include:

- Equitable ZEV and Infrastructure: A reduction of General Fund money offset by a shift to the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, maintaining approximately \$2.1 billion for programs expanding ZEV infrastructure access.
- Heavy-Duty Zero-Emission Vehicles and Supporting Infrastructure: The proposed budget maintains \$5.3 billion for programs that support port ZEVs and infrastructure that support drayage, transit, and school buses.



- Zero-Emission Mobility: The proposed budget maintains \$180 million for sustainable community-based transportation equity projects.
- Emerging Opportunities and Federal Programs: Maintains \$1.3 billion to invest in pilot projects in high carbon-emitting sectors in addition to supporting hydrogen infrastructure and vehicle grid integration at scale.

Other significant budget adjustments relating to climate change:

- California Arrearage Payment Program: To address residential utility arrearages arising during the COVID-19 pandemic, the proposed budget will revert \$400 million in California Emergency Relief Funds in 2022-23 to the General Fund for savings from this program based on applications received and approved for funding.
- Industrial Grid Support and Decarbonization: Maintains roughly \$90 million for projects supporting decarbonization and to provide grid support.

Wildfire and Forest Resilience

The proposed budget reflects a reduction of \$91 million in General Fund investments partially offset by a \$14 million shift to Proposition 98 funding. It total, the proposed budget maintains \$2.7 billion of the previously budgeted \$2.8 billion in funding to support investments in forest health and fire prevention. Moreover, the proposed budget includes a "trigger" such that reductions not otherwise offset by other funds will be restored in January 2024 if sufficient General Funds materialize.

Drought Response and Water Resilience

In the category of Drought Response and Water Resilience, the proposed budget maintains \$8.6 billion of already committed funding with \$194 in General Fund reductions. To continue to support the state's drought response, the implementation of the state's water supply strategy, and increase flood preparedness and response, the proposed budget makes the following significant new investments:

- Urban Flood Risk Reduction: \$135.5 million over two years to support local agencies in reducing urban flood risk.
- Delta Levees: \$40.6 million for ongoing Delta projects to reduce the risk of levee failure and flooding and reduce the risk of saltwater intrusion while providing habitat benefits.
- Central Valley Flood Protection: \$25 million to contribute to ecosystem restoration and agricultural sustainability by supporting projects that can reduce the risk of flooding in the Central Valley.
- Urban Water Use Objectives: \$7 million General Fund over the next four years to implement Senate Bill 1157 (Chapter 679, Statutes of 2022).

Areas of Drought Response and Water Resilience that will be reduced to address the budget shortfall:

- Watershed Resilience Programs: Reduction of \$24 million in 2023-24 and a delay of \$270 million to 2024-25.
- Perfluoroalkyl and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS) Cleanup: A reduction of \$70 million in 2023-24 and a delay of \$30 million in 2024-25.



- Water Recycling: A reduction of \$40 million in 2023-24.
- State Water Efficiency and Enhancement Program: A reduction of \$40 million in 2022-23.

Extreme Heat and Community Resilience

The proposed budget maintains \$444 million of extreme heat funding and \$1.6 billion for community resilience funding over the next several years to build long-term climate resilience and reduce the urgent risks associated with extreme heat. These programs are designed to advance environmental justice, position economic resilience with California's climate agenda, and empower regional, tribal, and local communities.

Snow Survey Shows December Storms Provided Big Snow Totals with More Systems, Flooding in Forecast

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) conducted the first snow survey of the season at Phillips Station. The manual survey recorded 55.5 inches of snow depth and a snow water equivalent of 17.5 inches, which is 177 percent of average for this location. The snow water equivalent measures the amount of water contained in the snowpack and is a key component of DWR's water supply forecast. Statewide the snowpack is 174 percent of average for this date. Conditions so far this season have proven to be strikingly similar to last year when California saw some early rainstorms and strong December snow totals only to have the driest January through March on record.

One year ago, the Phillips survey showed the seventh highest January measurements on record for that location. However, those results were followed by three months of extremely dry conditions and by April 1 of last year, the Phillips survey measurements were the third lowest on record. More telling than a survey at a single location are DWR's electronic readings from 130 stations placed throughout the state. Measurements indicate that statewide, the snowpack's snow water equivalent is 17.1 inches, or 174 percent of average for this date. This January's results are similar to results in 2013 and 2022 when the January 1 snowpack was at or above average conditions, only for dry weather to set in and lead to drought conditions by the end of the water year (September 30). In 2013, the first snow survey of the season also provided promising results after a wet December. However, the following January and February were exceptionally dry, and the water year ended as the driest on record, contributing to a record-breaking drought. In 2022, record-breaking December snowfall was again followed by the driest January through March period on record.

On average, the Sierra snowpack supplies about 30 percent of California's water needs and is an important factor in determining how DWR manages the state's water resources. Its natural ability to store water is why the Sierra snowpack is often referred to as California's "frozen reservoir." A below-average snowpack impacts water users across the state, putting further stress on the environment and critical groundwater supplies.



Due to these increasing swings from dramatically wet to dry conditions, Governor Newsom's recently released "California's Water Supply Strategy, Adapting to a Hotter, Drier Future" calls for investing in new projects and technologies that will modernize how the state manages water. In alignment with the Administration's strategy, the recently adopted 2022 Update to the Central Valley Flood Protection Plan identifies actions needed to adapt much of California's flood infrastructure to a rapidly changing climate. Current climate research indicates the state will see bigger swings from extreme heat and dry conditions to larger and more powerful storms that deliver temporary large boosts to the state snowpack as well as flood risk.


California storms: State's largest reservoirs getting closer to historic averages

Major water supply reservoirs around Northern California still have room even after the recent series of significant storms. Still, some reservoirs are up relative to their seasonal average. Folsom Lake is at 404', which is 42 percent of total capacity (and 98 percent of the historic average). This is actually down from the 55 percent of capacity it was a week ago, thanks to water managers continuing releases from the reservoir.

Camanche Lake is also reading at 73 percent of capacity, good for 123 percent of its historic average. New Bullards Bar, which has a similar capacity to Folsom, is at 74 percent of total capacity and 117 percent of the historical averageNorthern California's largest reservoirs remain below their historical averages for this date, but numbers show they are starting to fill up significantly. Lake Shasta, the largest reservoir in the state with a total capacity of 4,552,000 AF, is at 44 percent of total capacity on Thursday -- which is actually up 10 percent from what it was last week. This makes it around 72 percent of its historical average.

Lake Oroville, the second largest reservoir in the state, is at 49 percent total capacity and 90 percent of its historical average. The California Department of Water Resources has a constantly updating page monitoring the major water supply reservoirs across the state.



Dear President Young and Members of the Board:

The California Legislature reconvened for the 2023-2024 legislative session on January 4, 2023. The state budget is due from the Governor on January 15, 2023. For your convenience, attached hereto is the 2023 legislative calendar.

I. WATER SUPPLY CONDITIONS

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) conducted the first snow survey of the season on January 3, 2023, at Phillips Station. The manual survey recorded 55.5 inches of snow depth and a snow water equivalent of 17.5 inches, which is 177 percent of average for this location. The snow water equivalent measures the amount of water contained in the snowpack and is a key component of DWR's water supply forecast. Statewide the snowpack is 174 percent of average for this date.

California is expected to see continued rain and snow over the next seven days, with the threat of flooding in parts of California. Conditions so far this season have proven to be strikingly similar to last year when California saw some early rainstorms and strong December snow totals only to have the driest January through March on record.

One year ago, the Phillips survey showed the seventh highest January measurements on record for that location. However, those results were followed by three months of extremely dry conditions and by April 1st of last year, the Phillips survey measurements were the third lowest on record.

More telling than a survey at a single location are DWR's electronic readings from the 130 stations placed throughout the state. Measurements indicate that statewide, the snowpack's snow water equivalent is 17.1 inches, or 174 percent of average for this date. This January's results are similar to results in 2013 and 2022 when the January 1st snowpack was at or above average conditions, only for dry weather to set in and lead to drought conditions by the end of the water year (September 30).

AB 100 (Holden D) Drinking water: endpoint devices: lead content.

Current Text: Chaptered: 10/8/2021 html pdf

Status: 10/8/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 692, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: The California Safe Drinking Water Act requires the State Water Resources Control Board to administer provisions relating to the regulation of drinking water to protect public health. Current law prohibits, with certain exceptions, the use of any pipe, pipe or plumbing fitting or fixture, solder, or flux that is not lead free in the installation or repair of any public water system or any plumbing in a facility providing water for human consumption. Current law defines "lead free" for purposes of conveying or dispensing water for human consumption to mean not more than 0.2% lead when used with respect to solder and flux and not more than a weighted average of 0.25% lead when used with respect to the wetted surfaces of pipes and pipe fittings, plumbing fittings, and fixtures. This bill would, commencing January 1, 2023, prohibit a person from manufacturing, and offering for sale in the state, an endpoint device, as defined, that does not meet a certain lead leaching standard. The bill would, commencing July 1, 2023, prohibit a person from introducing into commerce or offering for sale in the state an endpoint device that does not meet that lead leaching standard.

AB 128 (Ting D) Budget Act of 2021.

Current Text: Chaptered: 6/29/2021 html pdf

Status: 6/28/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 21, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Would make appropriations for the support of state government for the 2021–22 fiscal year. This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as a Budget Bill.

AB 131 (Committee on Budget) Child development programs.

Current Text: Chaptered: 7/23/2021 html pdf

Status: 7/23/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 116, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: The Child Care and Development Services Act establishes a system of childcare and development services for children up to 13 years of age, which is administered by the State Department of Education and the Superintendent of Public Instruction and which includes various programs and services, including, among others, CalWORKs stage 2 and stage 3 childcare, migrant childcare, childcare and development services for children with special needs, the alternative payment program, and head start programs. These programs and services are contained in the Education Code. Existing law, effective July 1, 2021, transfers administration of these programs to the State Department of Social Services. This bill would make various statutory changes to reflect the transfer described above, including by repealing the statutes governing those programs, services, and duties from the Education Code and reenacting them in the Welfare and Institutions Code.

AB 135 (Committee on Budget) Human services omnibus.

Current Text: Chaptered: 7/16/2021 html pdf

Status: 7/16/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 85, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: The California Community Care Facilities Act provides for the licensing and regulation of community care facilities, including group home facilities, short-term residential therapeutic programs, and adult residential facilities, by the State Department of Social Services. The department similarly regulates residential care facilities for the elderly. Current law requires administrators of these facilities to complete a department-approved certification program. Under existing law, the department is authorized to charge a fee of up to \$100 for an initial or renewal administrator certification, and an additional \$300 delinquency fee for processing a late renewal. Existing law also authorizes a fee of up to \$150 every 2 years to certification program vendors for review and approval of the training program, and \$100 every 2 years for review and approval of continuing education courses. This bill would uniformly refer to these certification programs as administrator certification training programs. The bill would revise the existing fee structure, commencing July 1, 2021, including making the \$100 fee for processing a certification application or renewal subject to a 10% increase each year for 4 years, and imposing a new examination fee of \$100 for 3 attempts, and a \$10 per unit fee for processing continuing education courses.

AB 148 (Committee on Budget) Public resources.

Current Text: Chaptered: 7/23/2021 html pdf

Status: 7/22/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 115, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Current law, including the General Corporation Law and the Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law, specifies the formal requirements for filing corporate names and articles of incorporation with the Secretary of State. Current law authorizes the Governor, or the Governor's designee, to incorporate Golden State Energy as a nonprofit public benefit corporation for the purpose of owning, controlling, operating, or managing electrical and gas services for its ratepayers and for the benefit of all Californians. This bill would prohibit the Secretary of State from reserving a corporate name or filing articles of incorporation using the name Golden State Energy unless those articles are for Golden State Energy, incorporated and operating as specified.

AB 178 (Ting D) Budget Act of 2022.

Summary: The Budget Act of 2022 made appropriations for the support of state government for the 2022-23 fiscal year. This bill would amend the Budget Act of 2022 by amending, adding, and repealing items of appropriation and making other changes.

AB 179 (Ting D) Budget Act of 2022.

Status: 9/6/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 249, Statutes of 2022. Summary: The Budget Act of 2022 made appropriations for the support of state government for the 2022-23 fiscal year. This bill would amend the Budget Act of 2022 by amending, adding, and repealing items of appropriation and making other changes. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

AB 180 (Ting D) Budget Act of 2021.

Current Text: Chaptered: 6/30/2022 html pdf

Status: 6/30/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 44, Statutes of 2022.

Summary: The Budget Act of 2021 made appropriations for the support of state government for the 2021–22 fiscal year. This bill would amend the Budget Act of 2021 by amending, adding, and repealing items of appropriation and making other changes.

AB 211 (Committee on Budget) Public resources trailer bill.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/28/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/27/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 574, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Current law provides that a violation of specified provisions relating to pest control operations is a misdemeanor punishable by, among other things, a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$5,000. This bill would increase the fine to not less than \$5,000 nor more than \$50,000.

AB 442 (Mayes I) Surface Mining and Reclamation Act of 1975: exemption: Metropolitan Water District of Southern California: master reclamation plan.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/16/2021 html pdf

Status: 9/16/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 166, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: The Surface Mining and Reclamation Act of 1975 prohibits a person, with exceptions, from conducting surface mining operations unless, among other things, a permit is obtained from, a specified reclamation plan is submitted to and approved by, and financial assurances for reclamation have been approved by the lead agency for the operation of the surface mining operation. The act exempts certain activities from the provisions of the act, including, among others, emergency excavations or grading conducted by the Department of Water Resources or the Central Valley Flood Protection Board for the specified purposes; surface mining operations conducted on lands owned or leased, or upon which easements or rights-of-way have been obtained, by the Department of Water Resources for the purpose of the State Water Resources Development System or flood control; and surface mining operations on lands owned or leased, or upon which easements or rights-of-way have been obtained, by the Central Valley Flood Protection Board for the purpose of flood control. This bill would additionally exempt from the provisions of the act emergency excavations or grading conducted by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) for its own operations and infrastructure for specified purposes.

AB 474 (Chau D) California Public Records Act: conforming revisions.

Current Text: Chaptered: 10/7/2021 html pdf

Status: 10/7/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 615, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Would enact various conforming and technical changes related to another bill, AB 473, which recodifies and reorganizes the California Public Records Act. This bill would only become operative if AB 473 is enacted and reorganizes and makes other nonsubstantive changes to the California Public Records Act that become operative on January 1, 2023. The bill would also specify that any other bill enacted by the Legislature during the 2021 calendar year that takes effect on or before January 1, 2022, and that affects a provision of this bill shall prevail over this act, except as specified.

AB 831 (Committee on Health) California Retail Food Code.

Current Text: Chaptered: 8/31/2021 html pdf

Status: 8/31/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 155, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Current law defines "limited food preparation" and "limited service charitable feeding operation" for purposes of the California Retail Food Code. Current law requires a proposed new or remodeled food facility to meet specified structural and other building requirements, but specifies that existing private school cafeterias and licensed health care facilities presumptively meet these requirements. Current law limits the use of an outdoor wood-burning oven to the same premises as a permanent food facility. Under existing law, a remote food service operation located within a fully enclosed permanent food facility is not a satellite food service. Current law exempts mobile food facilities from

specified requirements, including the provision of clean toilet rooms for use by employees. Existing law requires a cottage food operation to label prepackaged foods with a notice that it was made or repackaged in a home kitchen. This bill would define "limited food preparation" to include holding, portioning, and dispensing foods prepared by a catering operation.

AB 850 (Gallagher R) City property: sale of water utility property.

Current Text: Chaptered: 10/8/2021 html pdf

Status: 10/8/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 705, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Current law, until January 1, 2022, authorizes the City of El Monte, the City of Montebello, and the City of Willows to sell its public utility for furnishing water service for the purpose of consolidating the system with another public water system if the potentially subsumed public water system is wholly within the boundaries of the city and the city determines that it is uneconomical and not in the public interest to own and operate the public utility, subject to additional requirements. Current law prohibits the sale of the public utility or requires an election to be called for voters to approve the sale if a certain percentage of interested persons protest the sale of the public utility, and defines "interested person" to mean a person who is a resident of the city. This bill would extend the authorization to consolidate water systems until January 1, 2024. The bill would delete the requirement that the potentially subsumed public water system be wholly within the boundaries of the city.

AB 1204 (Wicks D) Hospital equity reporting.

Current Text: Chaptered: 10/9/2021 html pdf

Status: 10/9/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 751, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Current law requires a private, not-for-profit hospital to adopt and update a community benefits plan that describes the activities the hospital has undertaken to address identified community needs within its mission and financial capacity, including health care services rendered to vulnerable populations. Current law defines "vulnerable populations" for these purposes to mean a population that is exposed to medical or financial risk by virtue of being uninsured, underinsured, or eligible for Medi-Cal, Medicare, California Children's Services Program, or county indigent programs. Current law requires a hospital to annually submit its community benefits plan to the department not later than 150 days after the hospital's fiscal year ends. This bill would add racial and ethnic groups experiencing disparate health outcomes and socially disadvantaged groups to the definition of "vulnerable populations" for community benefits reporting purposes.

AB 1250 (Calderon D) Water and sewer system corporations: consolidation of service.

Current Text: Chaptered: 10/8/2021 html pdf

Status: 10/8/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 713, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: The California Safe Drinking Water Act provides for the operation of public water systems, which include small community water systems, and imposes on the State Water Resources Control Board related regulatory responsibilities and duties. Current law authorizes the state board to order consolidation of public water systems where a public water system or state small water system serving a disadvantaged community consistently fails to provide an adequate supply of safe drinking water, as provided. This bill, the Consolidation for Safe Drinking Water Act of 2021, would authorize a water or sewer system corporation to file an application and obtain approval from the Public Utilities Commission through an order authorizing the water or sewer system corporation to consolidate with a small community water system or state small water identified as failing or at risk of failing by the state board.

AB 1428 (Quirk D) Safe Drinking Water Act: applicability.

Current Text: Chaptered: 7/9/2021 html pdf

Status: 7/9/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 64, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Under current law, a water district, as defined, in existence prior to May 18, 1994, that provides primarily agricultural services through a piped water system with only incidental residential or similar uses is not considered to be a public water system under specified conditions, including the system certifying that it is providing alternative water for residential or similar uses for drinking water and cooking to achieve the equivalent level of public health protection provided by the applicable primary drinking water regulations. This bill would remove the above provision authorizing those water districts to certify that they are providing alternative water for residential or similar uses to achieve the equivalent level of public health protection provided by the applicable primary drinking water regulations.

AB 1642 (Salas D) California Environmental Quality Act: water system well and domestic well projects: exemption. Current Text: Chaptered: 9/30/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/30/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 859, Statutes of 2022.

Summary: The California Safe Drinking Water Act provides for the operation of public water systems and imposes on the State Water Resources Control Board various responsibilities and duties relating to the regulation of drinking water to protect public health. Current law establishes the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Fund in the State Treasury to help water systems provide an adequate and affordable supply of safe drinking water in both the near and long terms. Current law requires the state board to annually adopt, and update every 3 years, a fund expenditure plan that contains specified information, including, but not limited to, a list of water systems that consistently fail to provide an adequate

supply of safe drinking water. Current law requires the state board to develop a drinking water needs assessment to inform the board's annual fund expenditure plan. This bill would, until January 1, 2028, exempt from CEQA a well project, as defined, that meets specified conditions, including that the domestic well or the water system to which the well is connected has been designated by the state board as high risk or medium risk in the state board's drinking water needs assessment. The bill would require a lead agency, before determining that a well project is exempt from CEQA pursuant to these provisions, to contact the state board to determine whether claiming the exemption will affect the ability of the well project to receive federal financial assistance or federally capitalized financial assistance. The bill would require a lead agency that determines that a well project is exempt from CEQA pursuant to these provisions to file a notice of exemption with the Office of Planning and Research and the county clerk, as provided.

AB 1817 (Ting D) Product safety: textile articles: perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS).

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/29/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/29/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 762, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Would prohibit, beginning January 1, 2025, any person from manufacturing, distributing, selling, or offering for sale in the state any new, not previously owned, textile articles that contain regulated perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances or PFAS, except as specified, and requires a manufacturer to use the least toxic alternative when removing regulated PFAS in textile articles to comply with these provisions. The bill would require a manufacturer of a textile article to provide persons that offer the product for sale or distribution in the state with a certificate of compliance stating that the textile article is in compliance with these provisions and does not contain any regulated PFAS.

AB 2108 (Rivas, Robert D) Water policy: environmental justice: disadvantaged and tribal communities.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/16/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/16/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 347, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Current law requires the State Water Resources Control Board to formulate and adopt state policy for water quality control. Current law requires the regional boards to prescribe requirements as to the nature of any proposed discharge, existing discharge, or material change in an existing discharge, except discharges into a community sewer system, with relation to the conditions existing in the disposal area or receiving waters upon, or into which, the discharge is made or proposed. Current law also authorizes the state board or a regional board to waive these requirements as to a specific discharge or type of discharge if the state board or a regional board determines, after any necessary state board or regional board meeting, that the waiver is consistent with any applicable state or regional water quality control plan and is in the public interest. This bill would, among other things, specify that the state board and each regional board need to begin outreach to identify issues of environmental justice as early as possible in planning, policy, and permitting processes. The bill would require the state board and each regional board to engage in equitable, culturally relevant community outreach to promote meaningful civic engagement from potentially impacted communities of proposed discharges of waste that may have disproportionate impacts on water quality in disadvantaged communities or tribal communities and ensure that outreach and engagement shall continue throughout the waste discharge planning, policy, and permitting processes.

AB 2293 (Committee on Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials) Carpenter-Presley-Tanner Hazardous Substance Account Act: recodification.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/6/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/6/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 257, Statutes of 2022.

Summary: Current law requires the California Law Revision Commission to study, and limits the commission to studying, topics approved by resolution of the Legislature or by statute. The Legislature has, by resolution, authorized and requested that the commission study, report on, and prepare recommended legislation to revise, among other provisions, the Carpenter-Presley-Tanner Hazardous Substance Account Act to improve the organization and expression of the law. This bill would recodify and reorganize the provisions of the Carpenter-Presley-Tanner Hazardous Substance Account Act. The bill would include provisions to govern the effect of recodification and state that these provisions are intended to be entirely nonsubstantive in effect. The bill would contain related legislative findings and declarations.

AB 2327 (Committee on Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials) Carpenter-Presley-Tanner Hazardous Substance Account Act: conforming revisions.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/6/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/6/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 258, Statutes of 2022.

Summary: Current law requires the California Law Revision Commission to file a report at each regular session of the Legislature containing a calendar of topics selected by the commission for study, which is subject to approval by concurrent resolution of the Legislature. Current law authorizes the commission to recommend revisions to correct technical or minor defects in the statutes without the prior concurrent resolution of the Legislature referring the matter to it for study. A concurrent resolution adopted by the Legislature requests the commission to recommend revisions to the Carpenter-Presley-Tanner Hazardous Substance Account Act to improve the organization and expression of law. Pursuant to this request, the commission has made recommendations for the recodification of that act. This bill would make conforming changes to provisions of law that references the act or provisions in the act. The bill would become

operative on January 1, 2024, if the act providing for the recodification of the Carpenter-Presley-Tanner Hazardous Substance Account Act becomes operative on January 1, 2024.

AB 2638 (Bloom D) School facilities: drinking water: water bottle filling stations.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/29/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/29/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 793, Statutes of 2022.

Summary: Would require a new construction or modernization project submitted to the Division of the State Architect by a school district or the governing body of a charter school to include water bottle filling stations, as specified. The bill would require, for modernization projects, a minimum of one water bottle filling station for each school undergoing modernization, and for new construction projects, a minimum of one water bottle filling station per 350 people at each school being constructed. The bill would require water bottle filling stations to be placed in or near high traffic and common areas and to meet specified requirements, including dispensing drinking water that meets primary drinking water standards and secondary drinking water standards, as defined. The bill would provide that these requirements only apply to new construction and modernization projects submitted to the Division of the State Architect 3 months after voters approve a statewide general obligation bond that provides funds for school facilities for kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12, inclusive, at a statewide election occurring on or after November 1, 2022.

AB 2771 (Friedman D) Cosmetic products: safety.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/29/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/29/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 804, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Would prohibit, beginning January 1, 2025, a person or entity from manufacturing, selling, delivering, holding, or offering for sale in commerce any cosmetic product that contains intentionally added perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances PFAS, as defined.

AB 2877 (Garcia, Eduardo D) Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Fund: tribes.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/23/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/23/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 481, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Current law establishes the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Fund in the State Treasury to help water systems provide an adequate and affordable supply of safe drinking water in both the near and long terms. Current law continuously appropriates to the State Water Resources Control Board moneys deposited in the fund for the development, implementation, and sustainability of long-term drinking water solutions, among other things. Existing law requires the state board to expend moneys in the fund for grants, loans, contracts, or services to assist eligible recipients. Current law includes within the list of "eligible recipients," public agencies, nonprofit organizations, public utilities, mutual water companies, federally recognized California Native American tribes, specified nonfederally recognized Native American tribes, administrators, groundwater sustainability agencies, community water systems, and technical assistance providers. This bill would specify that any waiver of tribal sovereignty that is required by the state board for a tribe that is an eligible recipient to access funding from the fund shall be narrowly drafted to serve both the individual needs of the tribe and make the funding agreement enforceable. The bill would require the state board to include its designated tribal liaison, as defined, in all discussions with eligible recipients, except as specified.

AB 2931 (Bloom D) Pipeline safety: records.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/25/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/25/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 536, Statutes of 2022. Summary: The Elder California Pipeline Safety Act of 1981 requires a pipeline operator to make available to the State Fire Marshal, or any officers or employees authorized by the State Fire Marshal, upon presentation of appropriate credentials, any records, maps, or written procedures that are required by the act to be kept by the pipeline operator and that concern accident reporting, design, construction, testing, or operation and maintenance. The act authorizes the State Fire Marshal, or any officer or employee authorized by the State Fire Marshal, to enter, inspect, and examine, at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner, the records and properties of any pipeline operators that are required to be inspected and examined to determine whether the pipeline operator is in compliance with the act. A person who willfully and knowingly violates the act or a regulation issued pursuant to the act is, upon conviction, subject to a fine, imprisonment, or both a fine and imprisonment, as provided. Current law authorizes the State Fire Marshal to act as agent for the United States Secretary of Transportation to implement the federal Hazardous Liquid Pipeline Safety Act of 1979 and federal pipeline safety regulations as to those portions of interstate pipelines located within the state, as necessary to obtain annual federal certification. This bill would revise and recast those state provisions relating to record maintenance and inspection and would authorize the State Fire Marshal, for purposes of carrying out the requirements of state or federal law relating to hazardous liquid pipeline safety, to require the owner or operator of a pipeline to establish and maintain records, make reports, and provide any information that the State Fire Marshal reasonably requires, as provided.

(Committee on Jobs, Economic Development, and the Economy) Small Business Procurement and Contract Act: federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act funding.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/28/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/27/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State - Chapter 600, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Would require each state agency, in order to encourage small business participation in new contracts over \$500,000 for the construction, alternation, demolition, repair or improvement of the state's infrastructure that is funded with proceeds from the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (Act), to establish a 25% small business participation goal in all contracts that the agency finances with these proceeds. The bill would prescribe federal enactments that are deemed to be federal revenues from the Act for purposes of these provisions. The bill would require a state agency to notify the agency's small business liaison beginning April 1, 2023, of any anticipated contracting opportunities that will be paid with funding from the Act during the 12 months following that date and require its small business liaison to provide information to small businesses regarding available training and technical assistance that could assist the business in identifying, understanding, and bidding on contracts for projects funded through the agency with funding from the Act, as specified.

SB 115 (Skinner D) Budget Act of 2021.

Summary: Current law creates the Healthy Stores Refrigeration Grant Program in the Department of Food and Agriculture upon the appropriation of funds. Current law requires the department to administer the program and to award grants to qualified entities, which is defined to include a small business or corner store, a city or county with representative low-income areas that contain small businesses or corner stores, and certain nonprofit entities that meet specified requirements. This bill would change the name of the program to the Healthy Refrigeration Grant Program. The bill would expand the definition of "qualified entity" to include a tribal government or tribal organization under certain circumstances and would revise the criteria required for a city, county, tribal government, tribal organization, or nonprofit entity to qualify to apply for a grant.

SB 170 (Skinner D) Budget Act of 2021.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/23/2021 html pdf

Status: 9/23/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 240, Statutes of 2021. Summary: The Budget Act of 2021 made appropriations for the support of state government for the 2021-22 fiscal year. This bill would amend the Budget Act of 2021 by amending, adding, and repealing items of appropriation and making other changes. This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as a Budget Bill

SB 187 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) Human services.

Current Text: Chaptered: 6/30/2022 html pdf

Status: 6/30/2022-Chaptered by Secretary of State- Chapter 50, Statutes of 2022

Summary: Would establish, beginning July 1, 2022, the Office of Response and Resilience within the California Health and Human Services Agency to provide policy, fiscal, and operational organization, coordination, and management when departments within the agency are preparing for, mitigating, responding to, or helping communities recover from

an emergency, as defined. The bill would require the Office of Response and Resilience to, among other things, maintain and update an All Hazards Dashboard to identify the impacts of emergency and hazardous events and provide key data necessary to support agency response operation. The bill would authorize the office to enter into contracts for the purposes of implementing these provisions, and would, on or before June 30, 2024, exempt those contracts from certain laws relating to public contracts and from the review or approval of the Department of General Services.

SB 198 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) Transportation.

Current Text: Chaptered: 6/30/2022 html pdf

Status: 6/30/2022-Chaptered by Secretary of State- Chapter 71, Statutes of 2022

Summary: Current law requires the Department of Transportation to advance funds to a public entity eligible for those funds for a guideway project when specified conditions exist, including, among others, that the California Transportation Commission has allocated the funds pursuant to specified provisions of law. If, upon completion of the project, the advance, together with specified interest on the advance, exceeds that portion of the actual reimburseable costs for which the public entity has not been reimbursed, current law requires the public entity to repay the excess to the state for deposit in an account from which the advance was made. Current law requires the department to submit a report to the Legislature if the department encounters any substantial problems in carrying out the funding advance program. This bill would revise and recast the funding advance program to authorize, instead of require, the department to advance funds for a transit or passenger rail project or project component when specified conditions exist. The bill would authorize the department to adopt guidelines to advance funds under these provisions. The bill would revise the conditions that are required to be met before the department may advance funds by, among other things, authorizing the funds to be advanced if the commission has allocated funds pursuant to the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program.

SB 230 (Portantino D) State Water Resources Control Board: Constituents of Emerging Concern in Drinking Water Program.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/28/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/28/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 676, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Current law, the California Safe Drinking Water Act, requires the State Water Resources Control Board to administer provisions relating to the regulation of drinking water to protect public health. The state board's duties include, but are not limited to, conducting research, studies, and demonstration programs relating to the provision of a dependable and safe supply of drinking water, enforcing the federal Safe Drinking Water Act, and adopting and enforcing regulations. This bill would require the state board to build upon its existing work dealing with, and work to improve its knowledge of, constituents of emerging concern (CEC) in waters of the state and drinking water.

SB 403 (Gonzalez D) Drinking water: consolidation.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/23/2021 html pdf

Status: 9/23/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 242, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: The California Safe Drinking Water Act authorizes the State Water Resources Control Board to order consolidation with a receiving water system where a public water system or a state small water system, serving a disadvantaged community, consistently fails to provide an adequate supply of safe drinking water or where a disadvantaged community is substantially reliant on domestic wells that consistently fail to provide an adequate supply of safe drinking water. This bill would revise those consolidation provisions, including, among other revisions, authorizing the state board to also order consolidation where a water system serving a disadvantaged community is an atrisk water system, as defined, or where a disadvantaged community is substantially reliant on at-risk domestic wells, as defined.

SB 552 (Hertzberg D) Drought planning: small water suppliers: nontransient noncommunity water systems. Current Text: Chaptered: 9/23/2021 html pdf

Status: 9/23/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 245, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Current law required the Department of Water Resources, in consultation with the State Water Resources
Control Board, to propose to the Governor and the Legislature, by January 1, 2020, recommendations and guidance
relating to the development and implementation of countywide drought and water shortage contingency plans to address
the planning needs of small water suppliers and rural communities, as provided. This bill would require small water
suppliers, as defined, serving 1,000 to 2,999 service connections, inclusive, and nontransient noncommunity water
systems that are schools, no later than July 1, 2023, to develop and maintain an abridged Water Shortage Contingency
Plan that includes specified drought-planning elements.

SB 776 (Gonzalez D) Safe drinking water and water quality.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/16/2021 html pdf

Status: 9/16/2021-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 187, Statutes of 2021.

Summary: Thee California Safe Drinking Water Act requires the State Water Resources Control Board to administer provisions relating to the regulation of drinking water to protect public health. Current law provides that the California Safe Drinking Water Act does not apply to small state water systems, except as specified. This bill would expand the application of the act to small state water systems, as specified.

SB 905

(Caballero D) Carbon sequestration: Carbon Capture, Removal, Utilization, and Storage Program.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/16/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/16/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 359, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Current law requires, no later than July 1, 2023, the Natural Resources Agency, in coordination with the State Air Resources Board, the California Environmental Protection Agency, the Department of Food and Agriculture, and other relevant state agencies, to establish the Natural and Working Lands Climate Smart Strategy and, in developing the strategy, to create a framework to advance the state's climate goals. Current law requires the state board, as part of its scoping plan, to establish specified carbon dioxide removal targets for 2030 and beyond. This bill would require the state board to establish a Carbon Capture, Removal, Utilization, and Storage Program, as provided, to evaluate the efficacy, safety, and viability of carbon capture, utilization, or storage (CCUS) technologies and carbon dioxide removal (CDR) technologies and facilitate the capture and sequestration of carbon dioxide from those technologies, where appropriate. The bill would require the program to ensure that carbon dioxide capture, removal, and sequestration projects include specified components including, among others, certain monitoring activities. In carrying out the program's objectives, the bill would require the state board to prioritize, among other priorities, reducing the emissions of greenhouses gases and reducing fossil fuel production in the state.

SB 938

(Hertzberg D) The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000: protest proceedings: procedural consolidation.

Current Text: Chaptered: 7/1/2022 html pdf

Status: 7/1/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 89, Statutes of 2022.

Summary: The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000, provides the exclusive authority and procedure for the initiation, conduct, and completion of changes of organization and reorganization for cities and districts, except as specified. Under existing law, in each county there is a local agency formation commission (commission) that oversees these changes of organization and reorganization. Current law authorizes a commission to dissolve an inactive district if specified conditions are satisfied. This bill would also authorize a commission to initiate a proposal for the dissolution of a district, as described, if the commission approves, adopts, or accepts a specified study that includes a finding, based on a preponderance of the evidence, that, among other things, the district has one or more documented chronic service provision deficiencies, the district spent public funds in an unlawful or reckless manner, or the district has shown willful neglect by failing to consistently adhere to the California Public Records Act. The bill would require the commission to adopt a resolution of intent to initiate a dissolution based on these provisions and to provide a remediation period of at least 12 months, during which the district may take steps to remedy the stated deficiencies.

SB 1075

(Skinner D) Hydrogen: green hydrogen: emissions of greenhouse gases.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/16/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/16/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 363, Statutes of 2022. Summary: The State Air Resources Board is required to ensure that statewide greenhouse gas emissions are reduced to at least 40% below the 1990 level by 2030. This bill would require the state board, in consultation with the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission (Energy Commission) and Public Utilities Commission (PUC), to prepare an evaluation posted to the state board's internet website by June 1, 2024, that includes specified information relative to the deployment, development, and use of hydrogen. The bill would require the state board, in making this evaluation, to consult with the California Workforce Development Board and labor and workforce organizations.

SB 1137

(Gonzalez D) Oil and gas: operations: location restrictions: notice of intention: health protection zone: sensitive receptors.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/16/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/16/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 365, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Current law establishes the Geologic Energy Management Division in the Department of Conservation, under the direction of the State Oil and Gas Supervisor, who is required to supervise the drilling, operation, maintenance, and abandonment of oil and gas wells in the state and the operation, maintenance, and removal or abandonment of tanks and facilities related to oil and gas production within an oil and gas field, so as to prevent damage to life, health, property, and natural resources. Current law requires the operator of a well to file a written notice of intention to commence drilling with, and prohibits any drilling until approval is given by, the supervisor or district deputy. Current law authorizes the supervisor to require other pertinent information to supplement the notice. Current law requires the owner of any well to file with the supervisor a monthly statement that provides certain information relating to the well, as provided. Current law requires an operator proposing to perform a well stimulation treatment to apply to the supervisor or district deputy for a permit to perform the well stimulation treatment and imposes other requirements and conditions on the use of well stimulation treatments. Under current law, a person who fails to comply with this and other requirements relating to the regulation of oil or gas operations is guilty of a misdemeanor. This bill would prohibit, commencing January 1, 2023, the division from approving any notice of intention within a health protection zone, as defined, except for reasons related to preventing or responding to a threat to public health, safety, or the environment, complying with a court order, or to plug and abandon or reabandon a well, as provided.

SB 1188 (Laird D) Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund: financial assistance.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/28/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/28/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 680, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Current law authorizes the State Water Resources Control Board, to the extent permitted by federal law, to provide up to 100% grant funding, and principal forgiveness and 0% financing on loans, from the fund to a project for a water system that serves a severely disadvantaged community. Current law requires the interest rate for repayable financing provided from the fund to be 0% if the financing is for a public water system that serves a disadvantaged community with a financial hardship or if the financing is for a public water system that provides matching funds. This bill would delete those provisions relating to 0% financing and interest and would instead generally authorize the board, to the extent authorized by federal law, to provide reduced or 0% financing to further the purposes of the Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Law of 1997. The bill would delete the requirement that a water system serve a severely disadvantaged community in order to be provided with up to 100% grant funding or principal forgiveness and instead authorize providing that grant funding or principal forgiveness to certain other water systems. By making moneys in the Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund, a continuously appropriated fund, available for new purposes, the bill would make an appropriation.

SB 1254 (Hertzberg D) Drinking water: administrator: managerial and other services.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/28/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/28/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 681, Statutes of 2022.

Summary: Existing law, the California Safe Drinking Water Act, provides for the operation of public water systems and imposes on the State Water Resources Control Board various responsibilities and duties. The act authorizes the state board to contract with, or provide a grant to, an administrator to provide administrative, technical, operational, legal, or managerial services, or any combination of those services, to a designated water system to assist with the provision of an adequate supply of affordable, safe drinking water. Existing law prescribes the processes and procedures pursuant to which the state board may identify a designated water system in need of services, order a designated water system to accept services from an administrator, and work with the administrator of a designated water system to develop adequate technical, managerial, and financial capacity to deliver an adequate supply of affordable, safe drinking water so that administrator services are no longer necessary. This bill would, among other things, revise the definition of "designated water system" and limit the liability of an administrator when the state board appoints an administrator to a designated water system, as prescribed.

SB 1314 (Limón D) Oil and gas: Class II injection wells: enhanced oil recovery.

Current Text: Chaptered: 9/16/2022 html pdf

Status: 9/16/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 336, Statutes of 2022.

Summary: The federal Safe Drinking Water Act regulates certain wells as Class II injection wells. Under current federal law, the authority to regulate Class II injection wells is delegated to the Geologic Energy Management Division. Under current regulations, a well operator is required to obtain approval from the supervisor or a district deputy for a subsurface injection or disposal project, including Class II injection wells, and is required to file a notice of intention whenever a new well is to be drilled for use as an injection well or whenever an existing well is converted to an injection well. This bill would prohibit an operator from injecting a concentrated carbon dioxide fluid produced by a carbon dioxide capture project or a carbon dioxide capture and sequestration project into a Class II injection well for purposes of enhanced oil recovery, including the facilitation of enhanced oil recovery from another well.

SB 1380 (Committee on Judiciary) Maintenance of the codes.

Current Text: Chaptered: 6/20/2022 html pdf

Status: 6/20/2022-Approved by the Governor. Chaptered by Secretary of State. Chapter 28, Statutes of 2022. Summary: Current law directs the Legislative Counsel to advise the Legislature from time to time as to legislation necessary to maintain the codes. This bill would make nonsubstantive changes in various provisions of the law to effectuate the recommendations made by the Legislative Counsel to the Legislature.

SCR 53 (McGuire D) Climate change.

Current Text: Chaptered: 8/19/2022 html pdf

Status: 8/19/2022-Chaptered by Secretary of State- Chapter 119, Statutes of 2022

Summary: Would declare that a climate emergency threatens the state, the nation, the planet, the natural world, and all of humanity.

SCR 89 (Newman D) State scientists.

Current Text: Chaptered: 8/1/2022 html pdf

Status: 6/27/2022-Chaptered by Secretary of State- Chapter 106, Statutes of 2022

Summary: Would recognize and pay tribute to the dedication and professionalism of the state scientists who work on behalf of all the residents of California.

West Valley Water District (WVWD) is committed to working with stakeholders and representatives in Sacramento and Washington, D.C. to effectively communicate legislative priorities and support our mission to provide ratepayers with safe, high quality and reliable water service at a reasonable rate.

The policy's purpose is to guide District officials and staff in considering legislative or regulatory proposals that are likely to impact the District.

The purpose of identifying Legislative principles is to provide clear direction to District staff with regard to monitoring and acting upon bills during state and federal legislative sessions. Adherence to the Legislative Principles will ensure that legislative request and responses will be administered consistently with "one voice".

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- Participate in meetings with legislators, agency representatives and other stakeholders.
- Testify on behalf of WVWD, as needed.
- Review and advise on adopting a legislative platform for the incoming legislative year.
- Refrain from taking policy positions on behalf of WVWD, unless adopted by the full Board. Directors can take positions as private citizens of the community.

GENERAL MANAGER AND GOVERNMENT AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS STAFF

- Maintain a list or proposed legislation that may affect WVWD and ratepayers. Monitor bills and work with associations such as, but not limited to: Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA), California Special Districts Association (CSDA), American Water Works Association (AWWA), and other organizations.
- Submit letters and give direction to lobbyist to help advocate for or against issues.
- Make further recommendations and or seek further direction from the external affairs committee, if a bill does not fall under the scope of the legislative principles or is a politically controversial issue.
- Participate in meetings with lobbyist and other stakeholders.
- Establish relationships with stakeholders, legislators, staff and others on behalf of WVWD's advocacy efforts.

LOBBYIST

- Provide regular reports to staff and members of the external affairs committee on appropriate bills.
- Advise staff on state and federal legislation, relevant budget impacts, funding opportunities, and issues that directly or indirectly impact WVWD in a timely manner.
- As necessary, attend hearings and provide testimony on behalf of WVWD, as directed by staff.
- Maintain relationships with legislators, stakeholders and staff on behalf of WVWD.
- Maintain regular meetings with WVWD.

Legislative Principles

When considering legislative or regulatory proposals, the District may support or oppose based on the adopted policy principles. In cases where a legislative proposal, policy, or regulatory action is not a priority for the District but may affect the water industry, the District may choose to choose to take a "watch" position. There are also situations when the District may choose to take a position on a bill only if amendments are made.

For proposed legislation, either consistent with the District's principles or with legislative positions the District has taken, staff will prepare position letters for the General Manager's signature. Items not addressed in the principles may require further Board direction. Any legislative positions and/or actions that are deemed as potentially "controversial" by the General Manager will be presented to the External Affairs Committee and the Board of Directors, if needed, for further action.



SUBJECT: EARTH DAY 2023 STATUS UPDATE

BACKGROUND:

In 2019 West Valley Water District hosted its first Earth Day Celebration at the District, opening our headquarters to our ratepayers and community. The event required all staff to participate in and to showcase their department for the public to have a better understanding of the operations of the district. Additionally, we had numerous vendors that shared community resources and the district provided entertainment and meals to participants who attended.

In the last two years due to the COVID-19 pandemic, WVWD Earth Day Celebration was done virtually through videos, social media, and outreach to schools. This year the Public Affairs Team has been working to bring back the in-person on Saturday April 22, 2023 and ensure we have another successful event.

DISCUSSION:

Staff has a communication plan of advertising Earth Day (**Exhibit A**) as follows:

- 1. Soft Roll Out: Social Media Posts, Event Post
- 2. Direct Contact to our local partners
- 3. Direct contact to local businesses and schools
- 4. Newsletter
- 5. Bill Insert
- 6. Post Cards to Ratepayers

Earth Day 2023 will include: District open house, department showcase, workshops, vendor booths, live entertainment, animal show, face painter, and In-n-Out burgers (as supplies last).

FISCAL IMPACT:

The approved Fiscal Year 2022-23 Budget set aside \$25,000 towards the 2023 Earth Day event. The current estimated costs to host Earth Day in manner similar to how it was conducted in 2019, is as shown in **Exhibit B**. There will also be additional staffing costs associated with the Saturday event. The District should reconsider the Earth Day budget and/or make amendments to the proposed program for the event.
