



#### **GOVERNOR NEWSOM'S OFFICE VISITS IEWORKS**

ast month, the West Valley Water District (WVWD) welcomed representatives from Governor Newsom's office, who visited to learn about IEWorks, WVWD's water and wastewater industry workforce development program.

The IEWorks program, which received funding from the California Workforce Development Board (CWDB), provides internship and apprenticeship opportunities in the Inland Empire for participating community colleges and water and wastewater agencies. The CWDB is the Governor's agent for the development, oversight and improvement of California's workforce development system, which includes developing innovative initiatives through statewide programs.



During the visit, the governor's staff and IEWorks leadership met with two former interns who successfully completed the program. Both interns earned positions at WVWD and are currently utilizing the IEWorks skills they learned.

### WVWD HOSTS INAUGURAL LEADERSHIP ROUNDTABLE



n May, the West Valley Water District (WVWD) hosted its first leadership roundtable with federal, state and local government representatives to share the critical investments the organization is making in infrastructure, technology and the community.

At the event, Board President Channing Hawkins and WVWD staff explained how WVWD is building a water system that will ensure water reliability and improve service for ratepayers in an equitable and sustainable manner. Staff also delivered detailed presentations on the agency's top projects and priorities, which included developing new wells in Fontana, building a new reservoir in San Bernardino, constructing new pump stations in Lord Ranch and Rialto, relocating hard-to-access pipelines in Bloomington and more.

The roundtable provided a forum for collaboration between WVWD leadership and officials at various levels of government. Amid rapid population growth and other major challenges in the Inland Empire, WVWD will continue to engage regional federal, state and local officials to make water infrastructure projects a priority.








# **2021 DRINKING WATER QUALITY REPORT NOW AVAILABLE**
