According to the EPA, the average household leak can account for 10,000 gallons of water wasted every year. Finding and fixing leaks early helps save money and valuable water. Consider following these steps to create a more water-efficient home.



CHECK FOR LEAKS:


- Regularly schedule time to visually inspect your fixtures both in and outside of your home for leaks.
- Look for dripping water and moisture in sinks, bathtub faucets and showerheads. Check under sinks for wet spots or musty smells.
- Turn off your home's water. Visually inspect hose bibbs and outdoor faucets for leaks.

FIX LEAKS:

- Maintain water fixtures to prevent the development of conditions that can lead to corrosion and cause leaks.
- Check aerators and washers in faucets and replace them as needed.
- Replace old fixtures around your home and invest in water efficient products.
