

FREE VIRTUAL WORKSHOP: DESIGNING A WATER EFFICIENT LANDSCAPE





Tater leaks account for about 15% water loss in domestic households. To ensure you are not leaking water and money, you can use your water meter to detect wasteful leaks. Here's how:

- 1. Locate your water meter.
- 2. Make sure all water consuming devices and appliances (inside and outside) has been turned off. Leave shut-off valves open.
- 3. Read your meter and write down the figure. While reading your meter, find the flow indicator. This is usually a triangle or circle on the face of the meter. If it is moving, there is likely a leak.
- 4. Leave the water off and wait at least 1 hour, then read your meter again.
- 5. If the reading has changed, there is a leak. For more details, click the link below.
