






Introduction

On January 16, 2025, the West Valley Water District (WVWD) Board of Directors adopted the 2025–2026 Legislative Platform—our guiding document for the current legislative session. This platform outlines the District's priorities, defines desired outcomes, and establishes positions on proposed legislation and policy matters impacting our region, all in alignment with WVWD's strategic plan.



Developed collaboratively by the Public Outreach and Government Affairs team, in partnership with WVWD's lobbyists, management, and Board of Directors, the Legislative Platform reflects the District's anticipated needs and advocacy goals for the legislative term.

Throughout 2025, WVWD actively supported legislative proposals, regulatory actions, and policy initiatives at both the state and federal levels that aligned with our platform. We monitored over **50 bills** and formally took positions on **16**. Our team also participated in multiple advocacy trips to Sacramento and Washington, D.C., collaborated with regional partners, and worked closely with key associations and lobbyists to advance our objectives.

This report provides a summary of the key achievements and impactful advocacy efforts that defined this successful legislative year.

State Report

The first year of the two-year session has wrapped and the California Legislature is now in Interim Study Recess. Both houses will reconvene on Monday, January 5, 2026, unless Governor Gavin Newsom calls for an Extraordinary Session in the Fall, which we do not anticipate him doing.

As you'll recall, the Legislative Session began with the Governor and Legislature responding to major fires in the Los Angeles metropolitan area that burned over 50,000 acres, ultimately killed 440 individuals, and destroyed numerous homes and businesses. Two bills amending the 2024 Budget--SBx1-3 and ABx1-4--were quickly moved through the Legislature and sent to the Governor's desk, appropriating \$2.5 billion to support emergency fire relief efforts in the County of Los Angeles. Governor Newsom signed both measures into law on January 23rd.

In total, legislators from both chambers introduced **2,397 measures** in 2025, including policy bills, resolutions and budget bills. This year, **917 measures** were successful in making their way through the legislative process and onto the Governor's desk. The Governor had until **October 13th** to act on these bills. Of the roughly **900 measures** that were presented to the Governor, **794** were signed and **123** were vetoed, for a veto rate of **13.4%**. In his seven years in office, the Governor has acted on every bill that has reached his Desk, which now total more than **6,600** bills.

At the center of this year's Legislative Priorities was the extension of California's cap-and-trade system – rebranded by Newsom as "cap and invest" – through 2045. The extension, hammered out in backroom talks, was one of the most divisive elements of this year's end of session energy package. The package also included: regionalizing the energy market, replenishing the Wildfire Fund, streamlining permitting for oil and gas production in Kern County, and allocating Prop 4 climate resiliency bond funds.

Additionally, a significant and unexpected piece of legislation during the last month of session was the redistricting package put forward by Governor Newsom. Both houses passed and the Governor signed: SB 280 (Cervantes), which calls for a special election November 4, 2025 and designates ACA 8 as Prop 50; and AB 604 (Aguiar-Curry), which draws new Congressional maps for the 2026 election. This package passed, and Prop 50 was voted on November 4th.
